Lesson Plan 6 – Protect your digital creation	
Duration: 45 minutes	
Aim	This lesson plan aims to show students what Copyright and intellectual property are. Students will learn the basics about copyright, they will reflect on how to protect their own creations and they will reflect on what is “legal” or not according to copyright and licenses.

Discuss with the class. - Have you ever created something digitally that you can copyright? - Give some examples of different digital creation that have copyright <p>2. Task 2. Copyright</p> <p>2.1. Click on the links and show them to the learners. They will learn everything about COPYRIGHT and HOW TO CREATE CONTENT.</p>
